Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review

February 25, 1984

Chairman J. Eric Engstrom called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. in the second floor conference room of the Memorial Building, Topeka, Kansas. Other members present were Thomas A. Barr, Ellen May Stanley, Del Knauer, Sister Monica Schneider, Jim Forsythe, Thomas A. Witty, Curtis Besinger, Ray Weisenburger, Joseph W. Snell, and Robert W. Richmond as the designee for the governor. Harry Briscoe, recently retired as general manager of the Santa Fe Railway Company in Topeka, was also present as were Dick Pankratz, Terry Marmet, Martin Stein, Richard Cawthon, and Carol Finan of the preservation office.

Sister Monica Schnieder moved the approval of the minutes of the August 27, 1983, meeting. The motion was seconded by Ellen May Stanley and carried.

Mr. Snell introduced Harry Briscoe who was present to speak to the board about abandoned/unneeded depots and the policy which Santa Fe follows concerning these. Many railroad depots in Kansas and elsewhere have been and are being closed because computerization has made it unnecessary to have local agents in every community. Safety was the railroad's major concern in the disposition of old depots. New uses for old depots alongside main line high volume high speed tracks are severely limited because of concern over the safety of people who might be drawn to the old facility. Branch line depots, because of the lower speed limits on those lines, are more likely to be considered for sale or lease for new uses. Wood depots are almost always donated/sold to communities or local historical groups or sold to the public when they are no longer needed on the condition they be removed from the railroad right-of-way.

Dick Pankratz brought the board up to date on events since the last meeting. Seven properties had been listed on the National Register: Glancy-Pennell House, Atchison; Gladstone (Elmo) Hotel, Arkansas City; Kress Building, Emporia; Robert L. Pease House, Atchison; Terminal Station, Hutchinson; KSAC Radio Towers, Kansas State University, Manhattan; Arkansas City Commercial Center Historic District, Arkansas City. Still pending is the Shawnee Street Bridge in Kansas City which was returned because the National Park Service had questions on boundaries. The nomination has been resubmitted. Kansas now has 380 National Register properties. Dick also reported that the initial draft had been completed on the Certified Local Government (CLG) process implementation. Board Members will receive a copy when the final draft is completed. Chairman Engstrom appointed Ray Weisenburger and himself as members of a subcommittee on the Certified Local Government procedures. The preservation plan Study Unit on The Period of Rural/Agricultural Dominance had been sent to the printer of few weeks ago. Upon receipt of the finished product it was discovered that the printers had omitted several pages from the booklet. They were sent back for correction, and board members will receive a complete copy when they are returned. Terry Marmet, Martin Stein, and Rick Cawthon reviewed the grant projects that are now in progress. Terry also discussed projects involving the tax incentives and the changes expected to occur because of new regulations on the tax incentives. Three part-time employees have been added to the Historic Preservation Department payroll: Cindy Tooker - North Central Survey; Rox McLellan - map project; and Ingrid Knudsen - KU computer project.

The board then considered properties for national and state register listing. Two archeological nominations were presented by Martin Stein. One was approved for both national and state register listing and the other only for state listing. Rick Cawthon, the new architectural historian, presented four properties for consideration to both

the national and state register listing. All four were approved. The board members making and seconding motions for approval are identified for each property.

Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review  
May 26, 1984

Chairman J. Eric Engstrom called the meeting of the Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review to order at 8:30 a.m. in the Don Quixote Room of the Holiday Inn City Centre in Topeka. Other board members present were Thomas P. Barr, Del D. Knauer, Sister Monica Schneider, Thomas A. Witty, Curtis Besinger, Ray Weisenburger, Joseph W. Snell, and Robert W. Richmond as the designee for the governor. Dick Pankratz, Terry Marmet, Rick Cawthon and Carol Finan of the preservation staff were also present as was Larry Jochims, the research historian for the Kansas State Historical Society. Also present for portions of the meeting were Jim French, Mike Ryan, Marge Schnacke, Doug Wallace, Lori Toedman, Sue Peterson, and John Corkhill.

Curtis Besinger moved the approval of the minutes of the February 25, 1984 meeting. The motion was seconded by Sister Monica Schneider and carried.

Dick Pankratz brought the board up to date on events since the last meeting. Two properties had been listed on the National Register: Shawnee Street Overpass, Kansas City; and the Harmon Archeological Site No. 2, Chetopa vicinity. The total number of Kansas properties listed is now 382. Dick also discussed the negotiations with the Kansas Department of Transportation for selection of candidate bridges for high trusses and bowstrings. Eric Engstrom and Ray Weisenburger reported on their attendance at the meeting held on April 20, 1984, to discuss the draft procedures for implementing the certified local government process. Dick reported that the staff was awaiting the National Park Service's comments before revising the draft. Dick also reported that the published RP3 study unit "Period of Rural/Agricultural Dominance" has been distributed and only approximately 100 copies remain. Richard Cawthon briefly discussed the second study unit.

At 9:00 a.m. the board members and staff went to the Charles Curtis House at 1101 Topeka Avenue which had been proposed by petition for state acquisition. Larry Jochims, who had done the research and prepared the report for the Kansas State Historical Society, accompanied the board to answer questions and point out features of the house. After touring the house, the board reconvened back at the Holiday Inn at 10:00 a.m. to begin discussion on the Curtis House.

Chairman Engstrom identified to the board and visitors the specific nature of the review board's responsibilities in this matter and reminded them that the review board was not an element of the Kansas State Historical Society but an independent board appointed by the governor.

He requested that board members offer any general comments or ask questions about the report furnished to the board by Larry Jochims, the

Historical Society's research historian. Questions were raised about the additions and alterations that occurred to the house and observations made about the foundation's condition and the environment of the house. Other concerns expressed included the need for the state to take proper care of the historic properties already in its charge.

Visitors were then given the opportunity to address the board. Jim French from Olathe who had initiated the proposal for state acquisition spoke first and cited the role of Curtis in Kansas and national politics and listed what he considered Curtis's significant contributions. He stated his goal was to have the property under the control of the state government and that he didn't have a specific plan for what the use should be.

Marge Schnacke of Historic Topeka, Inc., urged state acquisition and said her organization would pay for services of Gould and Evans of Lawrence to do a detailed analysis of the building.

Doug Wallace of Topeka urged acquisition and some use other than a house museum.

John Corkhill of Topeka who had grown up in the Curtis neighborhood urged acquisition as a monument to Curtis.

After all visitors present who wished to speak had done so, the board began discussion of the property. Joe Snell spoke as the head of the State Historical Society. He pointed out that the Charles Curtis house does deserve recognition and attention, but the state already has eighteen other properties which it has acquired. The Historical Society maintains them but hasn't been able to do so properly because of lack of funds. He believed that at this time acquiring the Curtis House would basically take money away from projects already pending. He also stated that no collection of any kind about Curtis' life is available or even exists. It would be hard to make a house museum of the home without any original artifacts. Some board members expressed reservations about the house and about the activities of Curtis as a politician. Others pointed out he was the only vice president Kansas ever produced. Finances were a significant concern for the board. Some felt acquisition and restoration of this property might mean less money for needed repairs at the existing state-owned historic sites. It was pointed out that the issue of the house and the issue of the role and significance of Charles Curtis were not the same. The problems of operating a house museum at the Curtis House were discussed at length - parking, traffic, lack of display artifacts, cost, etc.. A suggestion was made that since the house was not immediately threatened, the state might seek to negotiate a right of first refusal.

At 11:55 a.m. the board recessed for lunch. Prior to that all present were informed that the board would be back in session at the same location at 1:00 p.m. The chairman also reminded the board of the requirements of the state's open meeting law and instructed them not to discuss the Curtis House during the luncheon break.

The board reconvened at 1:05 p.m. Chairman Engstrom reviewed the factors in K.S.A. 75-2726 which the board was directed to evaluate and

then led an evaluation of each. The findings of the board in regard to each are contained in a separate report entitled "Findings and Recommendations Made by the Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review Concerning the Application for State Acquisition of the Charles Curtis House, 1101 Topeka Avenue, Topeka", which is hereby incorporated as part of these minutes. After the board had reached a consensus on each factor, the discussion of the acquisition resumed. Bob Richmond moved that the state not take any action until the current owner wishes to sell but that a right of first refusal be negotiated. The motion was seconded by Joe Snell. After some discussion the maker with the consent of the second withdrew the motion.

Eric Engstrom moved that the board recommend the state acquire the Curtis House and the adjacent house to the west provided that the necessary funds be appropriated for interior and exterior restoration consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Historic Preservation Projects. Sister Monica Schneider seconded the motion, which carried by a vote of five to four. Voting in the affirmative were Tom Barr, Curtis Besinger, Eric Engstrom, Del Knauer, and Sister Monica Schneider. Voting against the motion were Bob Richmond, Joe Snell, Ray Weisenburger, and Tom Witty. Professor Weisenburger explained that he had voted "no" because he opposed linking the acquisition to the condition that restoration funding be provided. He favored acquisition of the property.

The board took a brief break at 2:30 and then resumed the agenda at the point prior to the Curtis House tour.

Terry Marmet gave a brief overview on the Jobs Bill grant projects.

The board then considered properties for national and state register listing. Richard Cawthon, the society's architectural historian, presented seven properties for listing, six for national register and one for state register listing only. The one for state listing only was approved and three of the properties proposed for national register listing were approved. An additional property which the owners had proposed for National Register listing was approved for state listing only and two others were not listed at all. No motions were made to list Miller's Hall and the J.W. Parker House. The board members making and seconding motions for approval are identified for each property.

STATEMENT OF MARJORIE C. SCHNACKE

RE: PRESERVATION OF THE CHARLES CURTIS HOME, 1101 TOPEKA BLVD.

I am here as President-elect representing Historic Topeka, Inc. an organization charged with working toward preservation in our Topeka area. Restoration of the Ward-Meade home at 1st and Fillmore has been one of our projects. I am also currently President of the Shawnee County Historical Society; a Past President of the Topeka Junior League; am working on a year-long docent study program of the State Historical Society for its Museum of History; and have an AB degree from the University of Kansas where I majored in political science and history. I have been following this project for several years and most particularly when it was brought to attention by the Interim Study Report of the State Legislature in 1972.

Historic Topeka, Inc. fully supports the idea of the State of Kansas buying the Charles Curtis Home at 1101 Topeka Blvd.

I received a copy of your report yesterday. In reviewing all the information cited about Charles Curtis I find the bottom line is that he is the only native born Kansan that has served us as a Congressman, a United States Senator and as Vice President of the United States. Many states cannot claim a Vice President. We are lucky to have a President claim us, however, Eisenhower was not a native born Kansan. Curtis's role in the U. S. Senate was that of a leader and you only receive that distinction by being elected by your peers.

The early Curtis family has many adjacent ties to our country's history and development. They gave away land in North Topeka to help develop the railroad to come through Topeka and thus on across our country. The family home in North Topeka is gone but the Topeka Blvd. home is still left and it happens that it is located in a very fortuitous location. The idea of just preserving old homes is not what the State should be about but this home has unique value. It was owned by a prominent

statesman and is located on U. S. Highway 75 adjacent to our State Capitol complex. When you restore old homes you need to have an economic value to them and we have such here. I feel the criteria of the law set as guidelines for your Board of Review is met with this project - i.e. location, educational value, the significance of the man, public interest, accessibility, etc.

The report mentions restoration costs. These repairs can be done over a period of time. This is not an abandoned building but is being currently used as an office. Historic Topeka, Inc. is willing to pay for the services of Gould & Evans, architects in Lawrence, Kansas, a firm knowledgeable in the field of restoration to make a comprehensive survey. This firm has worked both for the State of Kansas and in the private sector. They have worked on such projects as the renovation of Marvin Hall (the School of Architecture) and Flint Hall (the School of Journalism) at the University of Kansas and won AIA awards of design excellence for both of these; the Gumble Building in Kansas City, the Navarre Building in Denver and the Riley County Court house in Manhattan, to mention a few.

The report mentions interpretation costs, however, no mention is made of using the volunteer community. This is the area I have always served in and exhibit costs could come from this community. I know that currently the Topeka Junior League is working with the State Historical Society in the development of a "hands-on museum" and "discovery room" project for the State and Topeka has many other good volunteer organizations that just have to be cultivated. A "Friends of the Curtis Home" could be set up so private tax exempt donations could be made for the purchase of Curtis artifacts - if they were not donated by family members. I am not so sure that we could not discover more artifacts if this home became a reality. I also mention that Mount Vernon is a very viable tourist attraction for Virginia and has a most scarce supply of George Washington artifacts.

As an economic endeavor we see this home having a joint use, either with office use by the Kansas Department of Economic Development for part of its Tourism Division - an ideal spot for promoting Kansas - and I understand that the KDED will have to move from its present location; used by the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce and Industry or leased to a commercial firm with a restrictive lease.

Let us think together positively for Kansas and not talk ourselves into the Land of Blas. This is our only Vice President. His home is strategically located near the State Capitol complex, not in some isolated residential location, and can be promoted as a tourist attraction, along with our State Capitol, the Supreme Court Building and right on out to the Kansas Museum of History. People will want to spend time in our state the more we have to offer and promote.

Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review  
August 24, 1984

At 1:00 p.m. on Friday, August 24, 1984, the Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review met in the Plains Room of the Vagabond Motel in Hays, KS. Martin Stein, archeologist for the Historic Preservation Department, began the meeting by briefly introducing the Walsh Archeological district, which the board would be considering for National Register nomination on Saturday and also visiting the site themselves. After Martin's presentation of the site, the members boarded two vans to travel to the Collyer, KS vicinity where the site is located. Once at the site, John Reynolds, the assistant state archeologist, gave the board an in-depth demonstration on "flintknapping" which is the procedure believed to have been used by early occupants of the region to make their tools, cooking utensils, hunting gear, etc. When John was finished, Martin then gave the board members a chance to see the sites themselves to search for stone chips, bifaces, horns, hammers, etc.

At 4:45 p.m., the group then boarded the vans again for the return trip back to Hays. The meeting was adjourned at that point.

Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review  
August 25, 1984

Chairman J. Eric Engstrom called the meeting of the Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review to order at 9:10 a.m. in the Plains Room of the Vagabond Motel in Hays, KS. Other members present were Thomas P. Barr, Del D. Knauer, Sister Monica Schneider, Thomas A. Witty, Curtis Besinger, Ray Weisenburger, Joseph W. Snell, Ellen May Stanley, James L. Forsythe, and Robert W. Richmond as the designee for the governor. Dick Pankratz, Carol Finan, Martin Stein, and Richard Cawthon of the preservation staff were also present.

Sister Monica Schneider moved the approval of the minutes of the May 26, 1984, meeting. The motion was seconded by Thomas A. Witty and carried.

The next item of business was the annual election of officers. Joe Snell moved that the current chairman, Eric Engstrom, and the current vice chairman, Ellen May Stanley, be re-elected. The motion was seconded by Del Knauer and approved.

Dick Pankratz brought the board up to date on events since the last meeting. Several people had attended the annual meeting of the National Conference of State Historic Preservation Officers in Washington, and Eric Engstrom was asked to give a brief report on that meeting.

Three properties had been listed on the National Register: the Robert Miller House, Lawrence; the Horace Lyons House, Berryton; and the Huron Building, Kansas City. The total number of Kansas properties listed is now 385. Dick also reported that the draft copy of the Certified Local Government process for Kansas has now been revised, reflecting the comments made to the preservation staff. Copies have not yet been distributed, pending the National Park Service's approval. Richard Cawthon, architectural historian, then gave a brief explanation of the second phase of RP3, "Periods of Exploration and Settlement." Dick reported that the Jobs Bill projects are all winding down. Quite a few of the projects are finished and the remainder should be done by the deadline. Pre-applications are now being accepted until September 10, 1984, for both survey and planning and acquisition and development projects although no funds are expected for the latter. Kansas State Historical

Society is co-sponsoring a Main Street conference in Salina on September 18 and 19 which has been organized by the Kansas Department of Economic Development. The board's recommendations on the Curtis House have been sent to the governor and leaders of the House and Senate. No response has been received as of yet. Mr. French has continued to promote the Curtis House project.

The board then considered three projects that were likely to affect historic properties:

(1) The 53rd Street improvement project adjacent to Shawnee Methodist Mission proposed by the City of Fairway. After reviewing and discussing the project, it was the board's opinion that not only would the project require additional land from the historic site but it would pose safety problems for visitors to the site. It was the board's consensus that the City of Fairway should be encouraged to divert traffic from the 53rd Street rather than seeking to increase it. Ray Weisenburger moved it was the board's opinion that the street widening project would adversely affect Shawnee Methodist Mission. The motion was seconded by Ellen May Stanley and carried.

(2) Parking garage/transit center across the street from the old Wichita City Hall. After considerable discussion by the board, Del Knauer moved the sense of the board that construction of that facility would be an adverse effect on the old Wichita City Hall and on the whole downtown area as well. The motion was seconded by Curtis Besinger and carried.

(3) Demolition of the Madden Elevator in Hays. After reviewing the situation it was moved by Eric Engstrom and seconded by Thomas A. Witty that the demolition would constitute an adverse effect on the historic structure. The motion carried.

The board then considered properties for national and state register listing. Martin Stein presented one archeological district for nomination to the National Register, and Richard Cawthon presented five properties, four for the national and one for the state register. The board members making and seconding motions for approval are identified for each property.

Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review  
November 17, 1984

Chairman J. Eric Engstrom called the meeting of the Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review to order at 8:30 a.m. in room 232-N at Marymount College, Salina, KS. Other board members present were Thomas P. Barr, Del D. Knauer, Sister Monica Schneider, Thomas A. Witty, Curtis Besinger, Ray Weisenburger, Joseph W. Snell, Ellen May Stanley, and Jim Forsythe. Dick Pankratz, Rick Cawthon, Martin Stein and Carol Finan of the preservation staff were also present.

Ellen May Stanley moved the approval of the minutes of the August 25, 1984 meeting. The motion was seconded by Sister Monica Schneider and carried.

Dick Pankratz brought the board up to date on events since the last meeting. Three properties had been listed on the National Register of Historic Places: the Frank Howard House, Atchison; the Mrs. Preston Plumb House, Emporia; and the Lassen Hotel in Wichita. The total number of Kansas properties listed is now 388. Dick also reported that the Madden Elevator in Hays has been demolished. Jim Forsythe informed the board that he had a slide presentation to make to the board later in the meeting. All of the Jobs Bill projects have been reported as being finished on time. Also, the 1985 preapplications have been received. More than forty (40) were received for acquisition and development projects, but no money is expected for these. Twelve (12) survey and planning preapplications were received, and full applications will need to be submitted soon. Dick reported that Kansas' federal FY 1985 apportionment is \$178,609, which is down about \$14,000 from last year. Joe Snell and Dick Pankratz were to go to Wichita on November 19 and 20 to attend meetings concerning the parking garage/transit center project. The Shawnee Methodist Mission road project has been resolved.

Tom Witty then gave an introductory presentation for the Whiteford (Price) Indian Burial Pit. He had also done the research and prepared the report on behalf of the Kansas State Historical Society. At 9:10 a.m. the board broke to tour the site location. During the tour of the site, Palmer Price was on hand to assist Mr. Witty and to help point out features of the site. The board reconvened back at Marymount College at 10:30 a.m. to listen to the remainder of Mr. Witty's presentation and to discuss the possible purchase of the site by the State of Kansas.

Chairman Engstrom requested that board members offer any general comments or ask questions about the report furnished by Mr. Witty. Ray Weisenburger had some disagreement with the development proposals. He thought the old building which is still housing the pit should be left as is with a new facility built over the top.

After lengthy discussion, Curtis Besinger moved that the board recommend purchase by the State of the Whiteford (Price) Indian Burial Pit. Sister Monica Schneider seconded the motion and it was unanimously carried, excluding Tom Witty who chose to refrain from voting.

Chairman Engstrom reviewed the factors in K.S.A. 75-2726 which the board was directed to evaluate and then led an evaluation of each. The findings of the board in regard to each are contained in a separate report entitled, "Findings and Recommendations Made by the Kansas Historic Sites Board of Review Concerning the Application of State Purchase of the Whiteford (Price) Indian Burial Pit, Salina, KS," which is hereby incorporated as part of these minutes.

In response to a question from Joe Snell, it was the consensus of the board that acquisition of the Whiteford Site should take precedence over acquisition of the Charles Curtis House if a choice had to be made.

The board then considered properties for national and state register listing. Richard Cawthon, the society's architectural historian, presented six (6) properties for listing, four (4) for the national register and two (2) for state register listing only. The four for national register listing were approved as was one of the two for the state register only. (The other was not listed at all.) The board members making and seconding motions for approval (disapproval) are identified for each property.
